Types of poems to support parents - (Just change the theme to winter)

Reading and writing a list poem

In this list poem the poet has thought about things that are special to her and imagined putting them in a box.



<u>Acrostic</u>

poems (write a word or

sentence around the theme of winter that begins with the first letter running vertically on the page)



Haiku poems - A haiku is a form of poem that originates from Japan.

A haiku has three lines. There can be any number of words, but there must be 5 syllables in the first line, 7 syllables in the second line and 5 syllables in the third line. Haikus do not usually rhyme.

Wet branches drip heavily

The soil is refreshed.
